TOWN HALL MEETING WITH MAYOR LEVY, FEBRUARY 4, 2019

Hillcrest residents and homeowners from Parkview at Hillcrest attended a Town Hall meeting at the large Clubhouse on 4600 Hillcrest Drive. The meeting was sponsored by the Hillcrest Leadership Council. City of Hollywood Mayor Josh Levy, our own District 6 City Commissioner Linda Sherwood and Broward County Commissioner Beam Furr were in attendance.

Hollywood voters will decide in a March 12 special election whether to let the city borrow \$165 million. Officials want to raise the money by selling three general obligation bonds. The 25-year bonds will pay for a new police headquarters, among other projects, officials told a packed audience at the Large Clubhouse at 4600 Hillcrest Drive on Feb 4.

The new police headquarters would go up just to the south of the current structure at 3250 Hollywood Blvd. It would replace a building with air conditioning and elevator problems, roof leaks, and a lack of space for the workforce, which has expanded considerably since the 1970s when the current building was built.



According to city Commissioner Linda Sherwood, the current structure "is so dilapidated that all must leave the building if a Category 3 or higher hurricane is forecasted." The proposed new building will also let police enhance their computer system. It will sit on a city-owned driving range which would be relocated to another part of the property. Once open, the old building will be torn down so the city can lease the 2-acres for commercial ventures.

City leaders also want to build a 23-acre nature preserve at the Orangebrook Golf Course, along with bike and walking paths and a parking garage. Plans call for construction of an 18-hole championship golf course at Orangebrook, as well as an 18-hole par-3 course there. A second par-3 course will be built at the city-owned Hollywood Beach Golf Facility. If approved by voters, that beach facility will get a new

clubhouse, too. Mayor Josh Levy said the redesigned golf courses would attract more area golfers, bring in money and help promote area tourism.

Additionally, the city wants to build new and reinforce existing seas walls on public lands along the Intracoastal to stem tides and protect the area from the effects of climate change, as well as replace aging playground equipment, gateway and neighborhood signs, and buy much needed lifesaving equipment for the fire rescue stations.

The city website breaks down the proposed bonds this way:

- Public Safety Facilities, Technology and Equipment \$78 million
- Parks, Open Space, Recreational and Cultural Facilities \$64 million
- Neighborhood Improvements, Infrastructure and Resiliency \$23 million

At the meeting, Mayor Levy said the city will appoint a 15-member Citizen's Oversight Committee to monitor the projects; 10 city residents will be part of the oversight committee and five slots will be filled by professionals such as architects, engineers and finance experts. City residents will make up 10 members; five slots will be filled by professionals such as architects, engineers and finance people.

Commissioner Furr encouraged residents to approve the bonds, saying, "It's like giving yourself a gift by making Hollywood a better place to live." He does not want to turn over the two city-owned golf courses to private development, noting the open land absorbs rain water and enhances the quality of life in Hollywood.


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STATE OF THE COUNTY - County Commissioner Beam Furr - District 6



Greetings Hillcrest Residents,

A new year means resolutions. Some people resolve to go to the gym more often or to lose a little weight. Others decide to make a resolution to travel more and see new places. Others have resolutions to make new friends, or to read more books, or to finally take up that hobby. These are all great resolutions to make. But the Broward County Commission can't just sign up for a gym membership, etc. That

means our resolutions must be something bigger and bolder. We must resolve to continue to make Broward County the best place to live, work, and play.

Fortunately, 2019 looks to be loaded with items and initiatives which will improve Broward County and make your life better. The Commission, and all the hard-working staff throughout our departments, has already taken major steps on critical issues like wages, affordable housing, and emergency communications. In addition, we know we will also face unexpected challenges that test us to our core. Broward County has proven over the past two years that we have the strength and courage in our community to make it through anything that is thrown our way. 2019 is already shaping up to be one of Broward's brightest and best.

There are three specific items I wish to talk about when looking ahead to this year. While you'll start to see immediate impacts of all of them, these initiatives are all geared towards the long-term future of Broward County. I hope their successful passage and implementation lays the foundation for a brighter future for our children, our environment, and all our residents.

Perhaps the most critical and immediate challenge we face is making sure that our environment is protected for years to come, and that we step up to the threat of climate change by making South Florida both more resilient and more sustainable. While another year may have come and gone, we can't just keep saying "another year" when it comes to climate change. 2019 must be the year we take major steps forward to create a world that is more sustainable and resilient. We can't wait for federal or state solutions. Locally, we face unique challenges from rising sea levels and temperatures. The time has come to create a "resiliency trust fund" which would set aside a dedicated revenue stream for projects like seawalls, electric car infrastructure and curbing greenhouse emissions. Our future depends on what we do now. We will be working with our regional partners to put our Climate Action Plan into action over the coming months, and I hope this "resiliency trust fund" helps this process along.

Another area where we need to start taking immediate action is solid waste. Trash may not be the sexiest topic. But our solid waste and recycling capabilities pay major environmental and economic dividends. Where our garbage goes and what becomes of it is no longer an issue we can ignore. We have already taken a major step forward toward creating a comprehensive solid waste program. An interlocal agreement was passed by all the cities who have collective ownership in property (Alpha 250) that has been recommended as a site for a recycling center. Recommendations on how to reach a 75% recycling rate and creation of an independent or dependent

district are part of upcoming discussions we will be having with our municipal partners. With so much at stake, the collaboration between Broward County and the 31 cities comprising it are very promising.

Protecting our future also means ensuring our children receive the best possible care. This past August, the Broward County Commission passed an ordinance that added QUALITY to the Broward County Childcare and Licensing checklist. This law means that Broward County will be making the most of its unique licensing role to encourage more employee training, lower teacher ratios and a targeted curriculum – in addition to our continued work ensuring the best standards of health and safety. This law will provide incentives for those child care centers seeking accreditation. Receiving accreditation means these facilities provide high-quality education resources at this critical stage of development. The best possible preschool and early childhood education are among the most effective tools for economic development and deliver significant social benefits for the community.

These are far from the only areas that we will see major progress in 2019. We have begun collecting monies from the transportation surtax that was passed in November, which also included an Oversight Board that will keep the spending process transparent as funds begin to be used. This year will also see major action on housing, homelessness, opioids, coral reefs, and much more. Stay tuned throughout the year and watch as Broward County lives up to its resolutions.

On Tuesday, March 12th, Hollywood residents will have an opportunity to approve selected city-wide improvement projects through a General Obligation (GO) Bond. You can learn more about the "Let's GO Hollywood" improvement proposal online at https://www.hollywoodfl.org/1123/Lets-GO-Hollywood-Bond, including viewing projects near Hillcrest. Residents will vote this March as part of a special election open to all registered voters in Hollywood. You will vote at your regular polling place, and just need to present your ID! This is a major vote for Hollywood's future, and an opportunity to let your voice be heard on a series of improvements that could have a major impact on our quality of life. There will be six different questions to vote on, so take your time and read carefully.

After a year of working within the community and doing their due diligence to talk to residents, I am confident that the city of Hollywood has put forward a worthy and well-vetted proposal. While no plan is perfect, there are two elements that I feel make a YES vote on the Hollywood GO Bond the correct choice for residents of Hillcrest.

The first is resiliency. Climate change is a problem that we are face-to-face with – especially in a coastal city like Hollywood.



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SPOTLIGHT ON BUILDING 25



A 65 inch Sharp HD tv hangs on the lobby wall of Hillcrest 25, just past the mailroom. The condo association bought it at Walmart for \$550. Wires attach it to a refurbished corporate-grade desktop computer, which cost \$130. The tv and computer provide insight into part of the governing philosophy of the five-member condo board, which is comprised of business people with a variety of skills.

The credo is communication, education and social events are major parts of running a building, which is home to 235 units on 12 floors. The tv and computer work together to form an electronic bulletin board. Inside Hillcrest spoke with two board members and a unit owner for this article.

Steven Hurtig, a former chief financial officer, is president of the association. He became a licensed property manager so he could be better informed about government rules and laws that condo associations must follow. Clay Hockman serves as treasurer. He set up the electronic bulletin board, which offers information and entertainment to residents. Hockman installed Microsoft Office, which includes a PowerPoint program that provides a slideshow running in a continuous loop.

Maria Zapata is a unit owner and licensed Zumba instructor. She leads an aquatic Zumba class every Saturday morning in the pool area of Hillcrest 25, which was built in 1976. This is their story:



Chaos, confusion and petty disputes are sometimes a part of condo living. To overcome these realities, the association bought a large tv and powerful computer. Hockman programmed the computer so residents could watch the screen and learn about building events. The bulletin board is programmed to provide animation and music, but these features won't run until the association finishes testing its creation. The association also is thinking about showing movies on the screen.

The electronic bulletin board was installed after an earlier communication effort hit a snag. Initially, building officials attached every paper notice to an easel in the lobby. But the notices began to look sloppy and deteriorate after a week.

The new system contains an unlimited amount of information, pictures and diagrams without looking cluttered and unorganized. The bulletin board also lets the association incorporate a mail and package notification system for unit owners as part of an expanding communication system. It includes a website that was created internally for less than \$500. The bulletin board and website display the same colors -- blue and white -- so unit owners see a consistent form of communication.

During a recent visit, pictures from the late-December Christmas party caught the eyes of viewers, who also saw information about an upcoming monthly meeting Hurtig holds privately with unit owners who don't feel comfortable speaking at board meetings. The meetings -- which last up to 30 minutes -- let owners ask questions and tell the association president about their concerns. It also gives Hurtig a chance to explain to unit owners what is happening in the building.

One major effort involved replacing the roof due to the damage from Hurricane Irma. Roof Technologies, a Hollywood company, got the job after offering cost-saving solutions to the association. Many bidders wanted up to \$1.2 million. But John Julian, the president of Roof Technologies, told building leaders they could seal the roof for six months for about \$50,000. This would let the condo hire a roofer after inflated costs from the hurricane came back down to normal prices.

Julian also suggested the association conduct a "pull test" on the roof, which cost \$3,000. Julian promised he would pay for the test if the roof failed. He doesn't usually do this, but wanted to establish good faith with Hillcrest 25, which had already agreed to let Julian's company seal the roof.

The board decided to seal the roof for six months; the roof passed the "pull test" and Julian repaired the damaged structure last year for \$490,000, considerably less than the amount roofers had bid in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma. The roof on top of the building, along with the roof over the building entrance way and carport were included in the deal.

The board approved a special assessment to pay for the roof replacement; the assessment included costs for struts and ceiling tiles.

Commissioner Sherwood said money from one of the bonds would pay to improve city parks.

According to Sherwood, exercise and playground equipment need to be replaced. Commissioner Sherwood and Mayor Levy said part of one bond raises money to pay for Traffic Calming Measures, including the possible installation of speed tables and roundabouts in neighborhoods concerned about speeding cars.

Hillcrest residents and homeowners from Parkview at Hillcrest also learned the city is listening to plans to redevelop a 30-acre city-owned property on S. Park Rd., near Pembroke Road just east of Hillcrest 25. As Inside Hillcrest readers know from past issues, part of the land is a brownfield. (A brownfield is a property, the expansion, redevelopment, or reuse of which may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant. Cleaning up and reinvesting in these properties increases local tax bases, facilitates job growth, utilizes existing infrastructure, takes development pressures off of undeveloped, open land, and both improves and protects the environment.) The other part is currently being used by the city Public Works Department and includes fueling stations for city vehicles.

According to Mayor Levy, the city reviewed four proposals from private developers who want to build on the land. At this time, the city asked the developers to submit a Best and Final Offer due by February 14th. The bids are due by about the time you get this issue of IH. Two proposals are commercial and two are mixed use – retail and residential.

Levy, Sherwood and Furr then answered questions from residents. One concern was traffic problems in the area. The Mayor stated that city traffic engineers could meet with Hillcrest leaders to discuss traffic those concerns.

Commissioner Furr answered a resident who was concerned about Hollywood seniors who don't drive, and the need for a convenient way to get to appointments, shopping, etc. Furr stated that Broward County was working on it. In about a year, he said, the county will deploy a shuttle buses to meet this need. The county is paying for it with money from a one cent hike in the sales tax voters approved last fall. Riders won't have to pay for the shuttle service.

Mayor Levy agreed with another resident that "It's kind of crazy the Sunshine State doesn't use more solar energy." But, he added, this might be changing because FPL is interested in developing more solar farms.

City property values are generating more tax income for Hollywood, Mayor Levy said. When he was elected in 2016, property values were assessed at \$13.2 billion, but are now at \$16.4 billion. The increase is important for an older city like Hollywood, which needs to maintain public areas and provide services in one of the largest cities in Florida, Levy said. He added, every additional billion dollars in taxable property generates \$7.5 million for Hollywood.

More than 16,000 building permits were issued in Hollywood in 2018, according to Mayor Levy. The permits are another way the city gets money to pay for local needs. Also, Levy added, the number of permits issued are an indication that residents and business owners are investing in upgrading the community.

After the meeting, several Hillcrest leaders made arrangements to meet with City Officials to further discuss the Park Road project. Inside Hillcrest will keep you updated.

The city of Hollywood's website provides the wording for the three proposed bonds. The website says:

To improve the City's neighborhoods, infrastructure and resiliency, including citywide traffic calming, neighborhood signage, rights-of-way landscaping, decorative sound walls, tidal flooding mitigation, and the undergrounding of north beach utility lines, shall the City be authorized to issue General Obligation Bonds, from time to time, not exceeding \$23,000,000 in aggregate principal amount, payable from ad valorem taxes bearing interest not exceeding the maximum legal interest rate, and maturing no later than 25 years from issuance?

To improve the City's police and fire facilities and equipment, including construction of a new police headquarters and parking garage and the purchase of fire apparatus for suppression and rescue, shall the City be authorized to issue general obligation bonds, from time to time, not exceeding \$78,000,000 in aggregate principal amount, payable from ad valorem taxes, bearing interest not exceeding the maximum legal interest rate, and maturing no later than 25 years from issuance date?

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
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February Kitchen Korner - by Cindy Abraham

I rarely repeat recipes but I had that awful cold that was going around, and I did not do much cooking last month. To top it off, my birthday was February 1st. I turned Fifty-Nineteen years old. Didn't even feel like going out for dinner. But because a lot of my friends and neighbors had the "crud" with varying symptoms, I did make a lot of my World Famous Lebanese-Italian Chicken soup. When I cook a whole chicken, we eat half and use the other half to make soup. It is the ultimate comfort food. I still have two containers in the freezer for anyone who needs some. It cures Ebola...allegedly...

World Famous Lebanese Italian Chicken Soup

(However, unless I make it you just have Italian Chicken soup... @unless you are Lebanese)

1 medium onion

Cooked half chicken – skin and bones removed and cut i nto small pieces

4 cups chicken broth

1 head escarole, kale or spinach, leaves only (remove stems), rinsed and cut into strips

1 rib celery cut in thirds and 1 bay leaf

 $\ensuremath{\ensuremath{\%}}$ cup sliced baby carrots or $\ensuremath{\ensuremath{\%}}$ cup matchstick carrots

1/4 cup Wynn & Lovett Acini di Pepe pasta (or any other teeny tiny pasta)

20 tiny cooked meatballs (optional) Grated parmesan (to top – optional) Spray pot with non-stick spray. Slice and sauté onion on low heat until translucent. Add escarole/kale/spinach and cover pot until wilted. Add broth and cooked chicken, celery, carrots and bay leaf. Bring to boil. Add pasta and cooked meatballs. Lower heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove celery, bay leaf and serve topped with grated parmesan.

EASY WHOLE ROASTED CHICKEN

This is the easiest recipe ever for fall apart, crispy-skinned chicken. Remove giblets, rinse chicken and cut open along backbone. In a pot that can go from the stove to the oven that is large enough to hold a whole splayed chicken, heat 3 TBS oil on medium-high. Season the bottom (bone side) of the chicken with your favorite seasonings. (I like garlic salt, pepper and paprika). Place chicken in pot when oil is hot but not smoking, bone side down and press for a couple of minutes to flatten. Preheat oven to 350 degrees and make sure the rack is in the middle.

Reduce stovetop heat to medium and brown for at least 10-15 minutes. While it is browning, season the top (skin side) of the chicken. Using tongs, flip the chicken over so it is skin-side down and cook for another 8-10 minutes until skin is slightly brown and chicken no longer sticks to the pan. Turn chicken over skin side up and place entire pan in the oven at 350 degrees for at least 1½ hours. You will have beautifully browned, tender chicken. You can even hit the broil button for a few minutes to get the skin extra brown and crispy.

FEBRUARY 2019 STATE OF THE MARKET

What's new in Hillcrest Real Estate? Well, we have some Parkview at Hillcrest news for this issue. There are now 5 resale homes on the market; a 3/2 one-story home, a 4/2/1 two-story home with water views and 3 townhomes. All are 3/2/1, between 1896 and 2033 SF under air, and all have a 2 car garage. One stands out as a pretty good deal at \$439,900 considering the 36K worth of upgrades, a lake view, and knowing that the construction was supervised by the buyer agent (like Brian does when we represent a buyer). The other four listings range from 449K to 539K and of course we hope they get their price. What's good for Parkview is good for us!

Current Hillcrest condo listings include five 3-bedroom listings ranging from 225K for a 3/3/1 that includes two master bedrooms and a guest room with it's own entrance and bathroom, to 305K for 2.444 SF 3/2/1. All the 3-bedrooms are in over 55 buildings. Three of the listings feel like a private home because they are on the first floor with patios and or lanais leading to the park or pool. There are some gorgeous 2/2 corner units available, many for under 200K. Most are remodeled and many have W/D in the unit. Most corner units range from 1000 to 1634 SF and some are larger.

The regular 2 bedrooms listings also have quite a few that are remodeled beautifully - most are priced from 125K to 175K depending on the size and level of remodel. Our Hillcrest 2/2 units range from 928 SF to 1296 SF.

It is almost impossible to find a remodeled one bedroom for under 100K and there are not many out there. Even our one bedroom units are spacious. Hillcrest was built at a time when space was not an issue so our condos are big and sturdy with lots of closet and cabinet space.

It is also tough to find a Hillcrest unit that DOESN'T have gorgeous views! Prices have not yet been impacted much by our high end new neighbors, so this is a perfect time to upsize or downsize. Life is too short not to #LOVE WHERE YOU LIVE!

However, Hurtig noticed the homeowner policies many unit owners purchased would reimburse them up to \$2,000 each, which offset most of the assessment. The condo insurance deductible was too high to offer any relief.

Hillcrest 25 also was beset by regular leaks and floods from damaged galvanized steel pipes that were installed when the building was built. Association leaders voted to install copper pipes, which are naturally resistant to corrosion and aid in killing off germs. Copper pipes also last longer than galvanized pipes. The project cost \$550,000.



The upgrade also let the association install manual shut off valves at every unit. helps isolate repairs better, instead shutting down an entire water line. Unit owners who pause in the lobby can see before and after pictures of the roof and the plumbing. Building upgrade also included a backup air conditioning system with some electrical improvements. The board plans to put new carpet throughout the inside common areas.

But maintaining the physical condition of the building is not enough, according to building leaders.

In January, Zapata started teaching a water Zumba class in the pool area, which is

only for unit owners living in the building. Participants pay \$5 a session, which lasts for 45 minutes on Saturday mornings. Up to 12 people at a time attend the class, which combines social and fitness activities as participants stretch their bodies and sway to the sounds of Latin music and lively tunes from around the world.

The sessions are done in the water to serve as a buffer for residents beset by lower back pain, joint stress and other physical conditions common to people as they mature. Zapata, who has been licensed for eight years this month, modifies the format so the movements are less intense than some moves practiced outside of a pool.

Other parties may be held in the lobby, in addition to the yearly Christmas party. And movie night may become a common element unit owners share in the common area lobby of their building.

Hurtig and Hockman stressed all building projects were monitored by Cindie Rock, the association vice president. They credited their fellow board member with making sure all work was done to the satisfaction of the association.

Bond Issue Vote on March 12. Here's everything you need to know.

Registered Hollywood voters who have requested Mail Ballots will begin receiving them this week. If you didn't expect one and don't know why you're receiving one, here's why:

On March 12 a SPECIAL ELECTION will be held, asking Hollywood voters to approve a General Obligation Bond. This referendum is divided into three parts. You can vote for all, none or some. I hope all three will pass.

GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND IN THREE PARTS

Part 1: Neighborhood improvements, infrastructure and resiliency.

This includes sound walls, FEC corridor (safety and landscaping improvements), traffic calming, and gateway/neighborhood monument signs.

Allocation: \$23 million

Part 2: Public Safety facilities, technology and equipment.

This part Includes new police headquarters, fire equipment, technology.

Allocation: \$79 million

Part 3: Parks, open space, recreation and cultural facilities.

- Improvements to 14 community parks
- Orangebrook and Hollywood Beach golf course upgrades
- Armory building renovation
- Dowdy, Rotary Park and ArtsPark, Art and Culture Center renovations
- · Purchase of the former Sunset Golf Course.

Allocation \$64 million

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WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT EXTENSION CORDS

Extension cords are for temporary use ONLY. Extended use of these cords is a violation of most fire codes, which is why they are commonly prohibited in dormitories and many rental properties. Because they are thin and bend easily, they are prone to damage and are common causes of fires.

Ironically, because of this, lamps never have long cords and kitchen appliances have even shorter ones which is the reason people tend to use an extension cord. If your lamp's cord is too short to reach a wall outlet and the lamp will be in routine use, you need to relocate the lamp so the cord can reach a wall outlet; or install a new outlet where you need it.


Again, for temporary use, extension cords are considered safe. But just make sure what you are using them for is not something that stays "on" most of the time; especially if you are not at home.

If you tell Google to notify you whenever your name is published on the Internet, then it will send you an email alert every time it finds your name published online. You can tell Google what kinds of web pages to search, how often to search and what email address you would like it to send those alerts to.

Go to the Personal Information & Privacy section to review Location, Search, and You Tube Search history. You can delete records one entry at a time or in one big sweep. You can also prevent Google from recording data moving forward. Privacy Checkup allows you to control what shows up on google+, the Social Network.

Make Google Forget You: GO AHEAD AND PUSH THE BIG RED BUTTON!

You can literally push the big red destruct button on Gmail, Google

Drive and all of the rest, (Google swears to it), that after you push this button, the data used to target you with ads will no longer exist. Simply go to <u>My Account</u> and look for <u>Delete Your Account</u> or Services.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Just be certain you want to do this (you cannot undo this) and follow the prompts/process to purge all this tracking data. Good luck!

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
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
